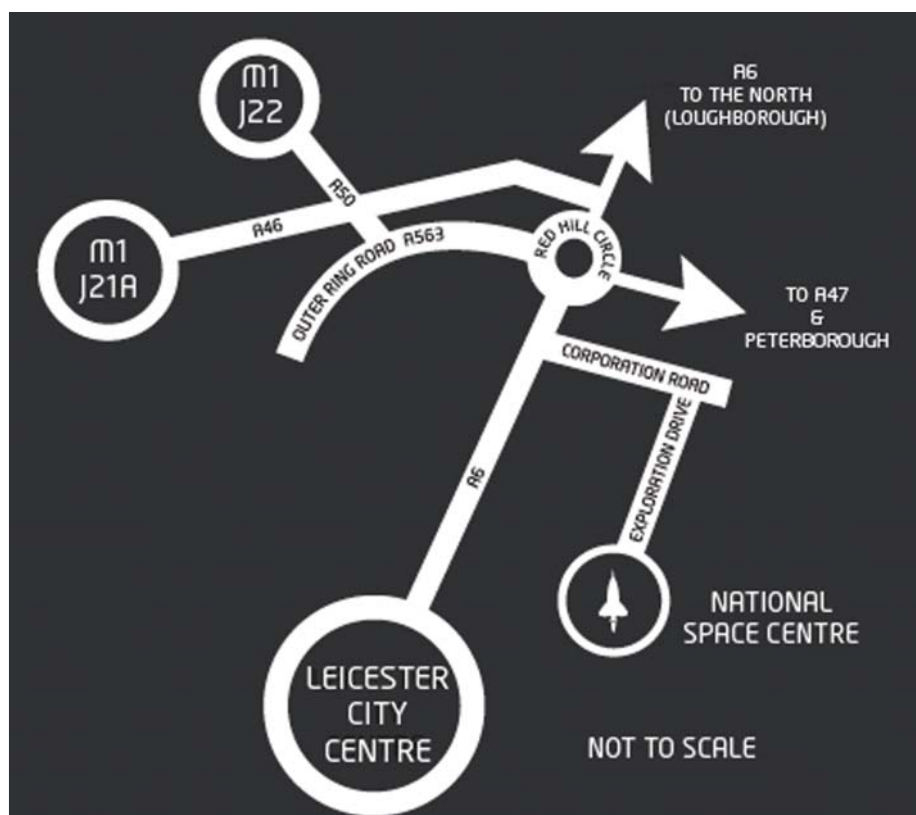


How to find



National Space Centre | Exploration Drive | Leicester | LE4 5NS

By Road:

The National Space Centre is located just off the A6, two miles north of Leicester City Centre, midway between Leicester's inner and outer ring roads. Brown road signs with a distinctive rocket logo will direct you from the arterial routes around Leicester.

By Train:

East Midland Trains and Cross Country Trains serve Leicester Station. From here you can either take a bus or a taxi to the National Space Centre. First bus 54 runs every 10 minutes Monday to Saturday and every 20 minutes on Sunday from Charles Street, a short walk from the station.

By Bus:

First Bus 54 runs every 10 mins throughout the day Monday to Saturday and every 20 mins on Sunday running from 9.30am. First Bus 70 runs from Belgrave Gate every 20 mins, Monday to Saturday to Abbey Lane. The Space Centre is just a short walk along

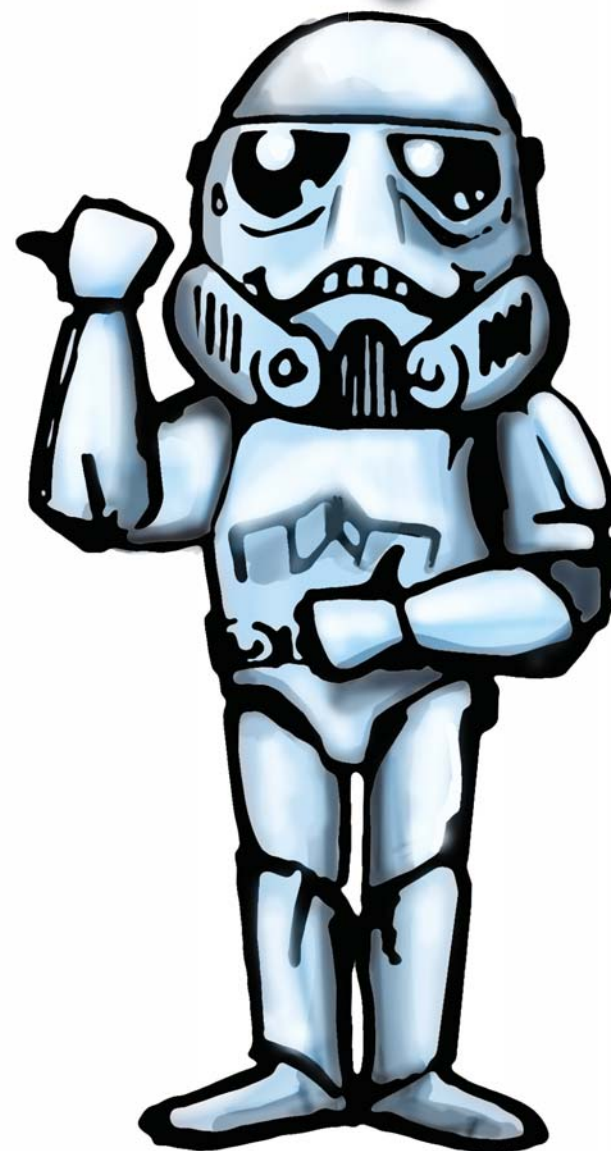

About Phil...

Phil Race leads highly interactive workshops (and keynotes) on assessment, learning and teaching in higher education. He publishes widely on such things, and details of his work can be found on his website www.phil-race.co.uk. His passion is about 'making learning happen', in an approachable way, without recourse to jargon, acronyms or elitism.

He started as a scientist, but gradually became an educational developer. He completely failed to retire from the University of Glamorgan in 1995, and again from Leeds Metropolitan University in 2009, and continues there as Emeritus Professor. He travels the country (and world sometimes) running workshops for teaching staff. His work was recognised in 2007 by the Higher Education Academy awarding him a National Teaching Fellowship, and the status of 'Senior Fellow' of the Academy.

He is known for using lots of post-its in various colours for brainstorming and prioritisation group exercises at his workshops, and even for getting diners doing things with post-its at the odd after-dinner speech! He is also known for bringing humour into presentations and keynotes – but always with the purpose of highlighting important points here and there.

Home is Newcastle upon Tyne, most weekends, and a tiny flat above the shops in the middle of Leeds during the week, when not on trains or planes to everywhere else. His better half is Professor Sally Brown, currently Pro-Vice-Chancellor (Academic) at Leeds Metropolitan University.

His other passion is classical music, and he is an accomplished performer on the CD player and iPod, and now and then he runs residential musical weekends on orchestral music at Madingley Hall, University of Cambridge.

His best known books include 'Making Learning Happen' (Sage, 2005), 'The Lecturer's Toolkit' (Routledge, 2006) and 'How to Get a Good Degree' (Open University Press, 2007).
